



Treasurer's Report

I am pleased to present the 2018-19 financial report for 1st West Waverley Scout Group. Thank you again to Therese Cowan for auditing the financial report.

We ended the financial year with a net loss of \$15,900. This was due to the major hall upgrades totalling \$50,000 undertaken during the financial year. This was partially funded by a grant of \$20,000, and we also received a 10-year interest-free loan of \$30,000, both from Scouts Victoria.

We were successful in obtaining two other grants throughout the year, one from Telstra for \$1,200 (thank you to Travis Kane for your assistance with this) and \$2,770 from a Commonwealth Government Volunteers Grant. Money from these two grants will be spent over the next 12 months on leader training, the newly purchased PA system, first aid and safety items and outdoor equipment.

The committee's plan for the next 12 months is to continue fundraising activities and to pay down the Scouts Vic loan well before the 10-year term.

The money raised by fundraising grew significantly during the financial year due to the following:

- 1. Net income of \$3,500 from Christmas tree sales this was the first year 1st West ventured into Christmas tree sales and the unwavering devotion of Mark Parfuss together with those who volunteered helped to make this the success it was. We look forward to making even more money in 2019 as we gain regular customers.
- 2. Money from the hiring of the hall doubled from last financial year, up to \$4,400. Thank you to Greg Robinson for looking after this during the last financial year.
- 3. As I mentioned last year, we held a successful Trivia night in late July, coordinated by Diana Angenent. We raised \$4,200 and hope to make it a biennial event.
- 4. Money raised from the Monster Raffle was down from last year, raising only \$1,700, however, I must again thank Jules Berry for her tireless efforts in assisting the committee with this annual fundraiser.

As with prior years, we paid the annual registration and insurance expense to Scouts Victoria of \$19,300 in July 2019. As this expense is not represented in the accounts, our net assets now sit at approximately \$42,000.

In closing, it is important to recognise those parents and Scouts who have volunteered their time and helped us throughout the year. I thank you again for your contribution as, without your support, we would not be able to continue providing this important service.

It is actually quite simple that without volunteers, your children would not be attending 1st West Waverley Scouts. The door is always open for assistance, so feel free to contact any one of the committee members or leaders, and we'll gladly accept your help.

- · Statement of Financial Position


Suggestions:

Group Leader's Report

1WWS ARAP annual report

Your Group continues to provide high-quality scouting. Here is some of the evidence:

- Youth Awards: Queen's Scout Lisa Hawkes, Grey Wolf Cameron Goddard, Emma Maisey, Joey Scout
 Promise Challenge Isaac Boylett, Edward Litcanu, Madeleine Mitchell plus a swag of Pioneer and
 Explorer Cords in the Troop
- High retention rates once again Group 85%, Mob 92%, Pack 88%, Troop 83%, Crew 75%
- 7 young people joined the Troop directly without having been scouts previously
- Second ever "all sections" Group camp in May 2019, Pax Hill Ballarat
- World Jamboree, West Virginia USA first ever participation by 1st West Scouts Sean McKinnon and Rachel Hawkes
- Nine Scouts and three leaders at Australian Jamboree Tailem Bend, SA in January 2019
- Recruitment of 3 new leaders (with a fourth this month)
- Hall improvements completed
- The innovation of Christmas Tree fundraising

As a parent, leader, committee or scout you may find amongst the section reports that follow other highlights that mean just as much to you.

Our Hall reached its 50th **anniversary in February** 2019 so a makeover was well and truly overdue. The main floor resurfacing, toilets, external doors, fireplace repairs and most obviously the kitchen renovations have set us up for another half-century. The benefits are two-fold – life is easier for leaders and committee and the Hall is more attractive to external hirers which will enhance recurring revenue.

The renovations were **expertly managed by Dean Whitfield**. Dean spent countless hours on planning, seeking approvals and funding from Scouts Victoria, engaging contractors and supervising the work and then dealing with the inevitable issues that come with works on this scale. Whist the committee operates collaboratively, it is absolutely appropriate to single Dean out for his extraordinary contribution.

Membership

At 30 June 2019, we totalled **80 youth** members, compared to 79 last year and 72 two years ago. The Scout section grew by 42%, is larger than the Pack for the first time since the start of the decade (as it should be in any decent Group) and today is three times the size it was 3 years ago,

Our total membership numbers have remained remarkably stable for several years - growth comes from recruitment underpinned by **retention rates**. Broadly speaking 75% is considered acceptable across scouting. Again, we have exceeded that with **85%** after 89% the previous year. Exceeding a benchmark like that is fully attributable to our leaders: it means the programs and environment created by them are what our youth members want.

We enrolled **16 new members** down from 20. We are still having to manage direct enrolments in Cubs due to progression from Joeys plus siblings of existing members.

Leaders

Welcome to New Leaders: Laura Litcanu (Joey), Dale Jarvie (Cub), Stewart Perry Rover Advisor who commenced during the year. In addition, I cannot wait for another year to welcome Jason Kingston who joined the team this month to provide much-needed support for our burgeoning Troop.

Long service recognition: 5 years to Adrian Hawkes and Sarah Thom Tydell; 35 years to Paul Crane.

At the end of 2018, we said farewell to Fiona Rudd. With three decades of her 40 years as a leader, 1st West were the major beneficiary of her devotion to scouting and the youth in her care. Several hundred boys and girls enjoyed the best possible Cubbing experience in Fiona's Pack. At the same time, we had to say goodbye to two more than able assistant Cub Scout Leaders. Claire Simmonds left us as her family moved to Sydney and Jason Cherry served the 5-year commitment he gave us. We thank all three for their service to 1st West.

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Challenges

We need to **rebuild the Venturer Unit**. Numbers have suffered as a result of period 3 – 6 years ago when we lost many Troop members (believe it or not 21 of them) who would now be Venturer age. (Other Groups in the District are successfully going through a similar process and we are confident we will also do so over the next two years.)

Similarly, the Rover Crew suffers when there is not a steady supply of Venturers. We will also **support the Crew** to maintain their membership and grow it as best we can.

At the other end of the age spectrum, we need to also ensure we **keep Joey recruits coming through** the door on a frequent basis.

I would really like **two additional members on the Committee** in the very near future.

We still need 1 assistant Joey Leader, 1 more Assistant Cub leader, 1 more Assistant Scout Leader. The Group must replace me and/or appoint an Assistant Group Leader or risk rotting from the head.

Every parent is expected to take a turn on the Committee or contribute as a Leader or Adult Support.

On behalf of the Group, I thank all Leaders for their contribution to 1st West over the last year particularly our section leaders who assist me in the Group's management. Thank you to spouses, partners and children of all our leaders for the support you provide.

To President Greg Robinson and all on the Committee, thanks for all your hard work and great results you are delivering for 1st West as well as for our enjoyable monthly meetings.

And to all parents who assist at weekly meetings, working bees or fundraisers and in camps and weekend activities thanks for bringing your children to our Group and for your contribution towards making 1st West the Best.

Participating in campfire songs, attending Whitehorse Showtime and preparing our Puppets for our ARAP performance have been great ways to extend our creativity. Christmas Craft, Lego night and our Mothers Day Bunning activities have also helped us to get creating!

Promise Challenge

The Promise Challenge is an individual challenge that can be completed by Joey Scouts after they reach 7 years of age. Our congratulations go to Madeleine Mitchell, Isaac Boylett, Edward Litcanu, Lachlan Foley and Campbell Miller who have all worked hard and completed the Promise Challenge.
